HISTORY OF MORTAR BOARD IN BRIEF

DEFORE 1918, on many university and college campuses D there were local senior women's honorary organizations striving to render service to their Alma Maters, with similar standards of membership and ideals of leadership. Through the efforts of four groups a national organization called MORTAR BOARD was formed by groups at Swarthmore College, Cornell University, Ohio State University, and the University of Michigan. At the first convention, February 15-16, 1918, the name from the locals at Michigan and Ohio State, the pin, a small black Mortar Board from Ohio State's, the ritual, constitution and expansion policy were decided upon. The organization represented, at first, a small section of the country. Very rapidly, by 1925, it was nation wide. In seventeen years, there were sixty chapters. Ten conventions have been held. Only minor changes in the ritual and the constitution have been made.

Purpose of Mortar Board

"To provide for the cooperation between societies, to promote college loyalty, to advance the spirit of service and fellowship among university women, to maintain a high standard of scholarship, to recognize and encourage leadership, and to stimulate and develop a finer type of college woman."

INTERSTING INFORMATION ABOUT MORTAR BOARD

NEW members are elected to Mortar Board in the spring from undergraduate women who will have completed their junior year at the opening of the fall term, by unanimous vote of the chapter. No chapter may have more than twenty nor less than five members. There is a scholar-ship standard to be met by each candidate. A faculty committee works with each chapter in an advisory capacity.

The national convention is the governing body. In the interim between conventions a national council of six, elected at the triennial conventions conducts the business of the society. For purposes of administration the chapters are grouped geographically into nine sections each supervised by a section director who is appointed by the president.

The national publication is the MORTAR BOARD QUARTERLY.

Each chapter contributes some service of value to its campus. Each chapter has traditional services and local responsibilities. No definite activities are scheduled in which the chapter must participate, since each campus is different and has its own needs. The type of service most frequently chosen are the recognition of high scholarship, orientation of new students, philanthropic activities, student government, housing of students, and assisting the administration.

There are now about 8,000 members of Mortar Board, including about 200 honorary members. Each year from the thousands of junior women in colleges, only about six hundred are selected for membership in Mortar Board. Our chapters vary in size within the constitutional limit. We have chapters in colleges and universities varying from 300 to 15,000 students with from 160 to 5,500 women. We have members in every state of the Union, as well as many foreign countries.

The national prestige of Mortar Board is so great that over one hundred local groups are desirous of petitioning for a chapter. We are welcomed by university and college authorities. No local is considered unless the college or university is given "A" rating by AAU and AAUW, until the local is at least five years old, and meets our other requirements for a strong chapter. Before any vote is taken upon a group, it is inspected by a national officer. Before a formal petition is made to all the chapters and to council, the local must be recommended by Mortar Board chapters located nearby. Careful consideration is given to the membership, the work of the organization locally, as well as the college and university.

Every wearer of the MORTAR BOARD pin must remember that its base represents SERVICE, its board LEADER-SHIP, its tassel SCHOLARSHIP, and through her membership increase Mortar Board's merit, reputation and prestige. We welcome and congratulate you, our new members.
