VANDALISM AT DEPOT!

Vandals broke into multiple buildings earlier this year, destroying property including doing some damage at the MKT Depot, located at the intersection of Main and Katy Streets. While the Hominy Police Department investigated the scenes, names of those involved have not been released to local news media. The depot and the accompanying red caboose have become a local landmark. Even though the last freight

train went through Hominy in 1977, the building was later remodeled, and the north section is still utilized by the Heritage Association as a display for railroading memorabilia. More depot history in our next issue!

I REMEMBER HOMINY WHEN

The sound and sight of the school bus driving past my house recently started me thinking about my school days in Hominy. In 1942, my triplet sisters, Sharlene and Shirley, and I started school at Horace Mann elementary. Back in those days, Hominy boasted two elementary schools, Mullins and Horace Mann. We lived three blocks from Horace Mann so our mother and sister, Eva, accompanied us to school for the first few weeks.

We attended Horace Mann School from first grade (1942) through fifth grade (1946). Superintendent was J.R. Staib and Miss Nevada Cowan was Principal at Horace Mann. Our first grade teacher was Miss Bernice Singree. Second grade teacher was Mrs. Irene Gardner. Mrs. Kathleen Peck taught us in the third grade. Our fourth grade teacher was Mrs. McWilliams and we finished grade school with Mrs. Stella Adams as our fifth grade teacher. My sisters and I are the only set of identical triplets who have attended and graduated from Hominy schools.

Horace Mann School was a three story structure but it has been torn down and a new school has taken its place. Setting on the grounds is the little sandstone school house built in 1904. It was the first school house in Hominy and has been preserved by the Oklahoma Historical Society. My sisters and I attended Brownie meetings and music classes in this building. Even back then, we could feel the oldness of the school but it was very sturdy considering its age. The Superintendent of

Hominy schools, Russell Hull and his staff, currently occupy this landmark building.

When I drive by the little sandstone school house and play grounds, I am reminded that on these hallowed grounds once stood a learning institution, Horace Mann School, where my sisters and I received our elementary education. I know the people of Hominy share lots of happy memories as I do about our beloved Horace Mann School as we remember Hominy when...
