I feel that I know you from WWA and you'r
Hominy connections, so we're not strangers. I
thank you very much for your saga on Henry
Grammer, which I read with consuming interest.
It s a contribution to the history of Osage
County, the West, and History of the Rodeo.
He was one hell of a cowboy, a true westerner,
generous and loyal. It took a world of digging
and connecting, and you came up with the ball.

He was also plain unlucky. Didn't have a chance against that sheepherder jury in Montana, and the so-called car wreck was an ending waiting to happen. I had more than one source that the steerng column on his Cadillac had been sawed on. Hale was the logical fixer. He was good at covering his trail. Set up Ace Kirby, who blew up the Smith house I agree with your account that Grammer knew too much. The third and final Hale-Ramsey trial in federal court at Pawhuska brought out that the had tried to hire someone to get rid of Ramsey.

For me, actually, the story of the so-called Reign of Terror began in Fairfax, early March, 1923, as a small boy with my family visiting relatives. I heard the terrible boom that night when the Bill Smith house was blown up with nitro. Next morning I slipped off to see the wreckage, and afterward was sorry after what I'd seen.

Many years later Tom Wnite, who had directed the investagion of the case for the then U.S. Bureau of Investigation, came to Norman, looking for someone at the University to write his story.

A western history professor friend of mine sent him over to me. I should point out that I had graduated from OU with a B.A. in Journalism in 1937, worked on papers at Cushing, Shawnee and the O.C. Times; by then in Norman I had sold some western short stories and a few western novels. Believe me, I was excited about meeting Tom White, a tall, gray-eyed Texan. We hit it off. I then spent a week at his home in El Paso. He gave me a lot of background on the case, including the names of the four men who went into the Osage as undercover agents.

Back in Oklahoma, I went to the Oklahoma Historical Society and read on microfilm the daily newspaper reports of the three trials. A lot of action. Well, I wrote the story, but never could find a home for it. I regret that it wasn't published during Mr. White's lifetime. A few years ago I wrote it as a novel, sticking close to the facts, and Five Star took it. FS does thirty-nine westerns and historicals a year. Sorry no DJ in this case.

I've always wanted the story told, and here it is, finally. I am part Osage, through my mother. My father was an early day rancher west of Hominy. I graduated from Hominy High in 1931, and proud of it. We had friendly kids, good teachers and really nice schoool facilities. By the way, Art, did you guys save the old bulding?

I'm way late answering your interesting amd important mail, but instead of complaining, a guy my age had better be thankful he can still sasddle up, so to speak. Thanks very much for plugging the Osage book and sending a review to the Tulsa World. I kinda doubt that Five Star sent review copies around, particularly to any Oklahoma papers. My fault, in a way, but I didn't know this last edition was out until I received some copies.

And say, congrulations on your award from the Chamber of Commerce. Mighty nice to be honored. I told you Ramona is sending me the paper.

That W.K. Hale letter to G. K. Sutherland is quite revealing, isn't it? It fits with what his nephew, Ernest Burkart, said his uncle Bill told him: "I've got everybody fixed from a road spervisor to the governor." The alleged note showed how he worked.

We lived across the street from the Sutherlands in Nominy, moving when I was five to Stillwater. There were two children, GFeorge Raynond and Virginia. I knew George in high school and later, a few timss, at OU. Years ago, not long before we left Norman to move to Silvr City, N.M. George called me from Oklahoma City. I invited him to Come see us. He declined. He was always a kind of lonely guy. I liked him. He was a good person! I wondered what happened to him Maybe he went to law school. I have a dim recollection that nmaybe he served as a JP in Nomiy. So far as I know Mr. Sutherland was considered an honest lawyer. In Osage County that was something.

I say "alleged" above, because of the way Hale operated. He was still going strong in 1924. Tom White and the undercover agents didn't enter the case until 1925.

FLASH! Just had a great visit today with Ruth Logan Frazier and her husband, Jay, of Oklahoma City. Her father was the late Dr. Cliff Logan, a leading physician in Hominy for many years. She helped bring me up to date.

Minnie Canada's files should be of interest. I wrote her a few times over the years: when a former student told me she was in a Houston hnospital, and when her Recollections of Early Day Hominy was published. I told her it was a contribution to Hominy's history. All those interivews. . . . Minnie worked hard. Ruth Frazier just told me that Minnie taught elsewhere after Nominy retired ner at 65. My senior year she not only coached the junior and senior plays, as usual, but added a sophomore play. In addition, she coached the debate team, What a teacher!


Glad you feel good at 80. I think we older guys should do something; however, I doubt I'll tackle another long project.



Border Patrol, BLM agents seize trucks carrying two tons of pot

U.S. Border Patrol agents assisting a Bureau of Land Management ranger Sunday found more than two tons of marijuana inside a pair of camouflaged trucks that the ranger had been pursuing Sunday northwest of Tucson.

At approximately 6:45 a.m. Sunday, Border Patrol agents went to an area near the town of Stanfield to provide assistance to the ranger, who was pursuing two trucks covered in camouflage tarps on Stanfield Road near Interstate 8, said Rob Daniels, Border Patrol Tucson Sector spokesman.

The ranger began the pursuit after seeing one truck suspiciously towing the other, Daniels said. When the ranger approached the trucks, one of them rammed the ranger's vehicle.

The drivers of the camouflaged trucks tried to get away and eventually bailed out, escaping into the desert, Daniels said. The ranger wasn't injured, he said.

Agents found 253 bundles of marijuana weighing 4,660 pounds and a loaded .45-caliber pistol inside the abandoned trucks, he said. The first truck, a 2006 GMC reported stolen out of San Diego, was turned over to the Department of Public Safety. The second truck, a 2004 Chevy, is being processed for forfeiture by the Border Patrol.

The marijuana, which has an estimated value of \$4.6 million according to figures from the National Drug Intelligence Center, was turned over to the Drug Enforcement Administration. Agents turned the pistol over to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

Agents didn't make any arrests in connection with the case.

The use of camouflage tarps to conceal the loads is something agents are seeing more in the Tucson Sector, Daniels said.

"You can definitely tell that

they are built for whatever vehicle they are being used on," Daniels said. "There is some effort there."

Through Jan. 31, the latest figures the agency releases, marijuana seizures were up 31 percent in the Tucson Sector for fiscal year 2007. Seizures in fiscal year 2006 broke all previous records.

"It clearly has not slowed down, and we really don't expect any kind of a slow down whatsoever," Daniels said. "We're definitely still being tested."

In another Border Patrolrelated incident, agents apprehended a group of 82 illegal entrants on Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument southwest of Tucson, about a half mile north of Camino del Diablo Road. They were arrested and voluntarily returned to Mexico, Daniels said.


